were presented to Dr. Ronald Plasterk, minister of Education, Science and Culture during the *Evening of the Stars* in Science Centre Nemo in Amsterdam on 4 April 2009.


New additions to UNOstamps in March-May 2009

Since the last Newsletter the main additions have been copies of the Dutch magazine *Grenzenloos* and the US magazine *The Journal of UNPI*. Also there are some new books on UN and general philately, the first book on the UN itself (from 1959), a new stamp catalogue and two comments.

Because of the new Europa stamps I have added one new subject page.

International Year of Astronomy

The International Astronomical Union (IAU) launched 2009 as the International Year of Astronomy (IYA2009) under the theme, The Universe, Yours to Discover. IYA2009 marks the 400th anniversary of the first astronomical observation through a telescope by Galileo Galilei. It will be a global celebration of astronomy and its contributions to society and culture, with a strong emphasis on education, public engagement and the involvement of young people, with events at national, regional and global levels throughout the whole of 2009. UNESCO has endorsed the IYA2009 and the United Nations proclaimed the year 2009 as the International Year of Astronomy on 20 December 2007.



New stamps

This international year leads to a lot of stamps. New on the site are the Europa stamps from Jersey, Liechtenstein and Netherlands. On the Jersey stamps the stars are made from simily silver and the Liechtenstein stamp is printed on hologram foil. One of the Netherlands stamps shows the actual lens (57 mm) that Christiaan Huygens used to look at Saturn. He discovered the moon Titan on 25 March 1655. The drawing of this discovery is also on the stamp.






Another new series of stamps is that from Papua New Guinea for World AIDS Day 2004. A nice series with a small sheet and a souvenir sheet. The stamps are very large so the First Day Cover is enormous!







New books, magazines and catalogue

Twenty new magazines, one general UN book, four philatelic books and one new stamp catalogue were added. Here just a few images.











This book on the right is bilingual and has the title *Plate flaws and overprint varieties of Netherlands New Guinea and UNTEA 1950-1963*.

Issued by a specialist stamp club in the Netherlands, it is the most comprehensive study on this subject and a must for every UNTEA collector.

Quiz

For the eighteenth quiz a fourteen people from ten countries sent in an answer. The question was: where is this stamp from? Three contestants answered Hong Kong, India or Singapore. Obviously the stamp was from a British colony. The right answer, however, is Aden. The stamp was issued for the 75th anniversary of the Universal Postal Union in 1949.

And the winner is: Martia Peeters from Belgium. The mint stamps are already in the mail.

but apparently it does.

On the UNOstamps website there are subject pages on almost every international year. And a lot of countries on the website have issued stamps for one or more of these years.



One stamp (from one of the 80 countries currently on the website) issued for an international year is shown here. I have erased the name of the country and the reason for its issue almost completely. The remaining image should make it very easy to find the right answer.

Visitors count

Up to 30 April 2009 UNOstamps has been seen by 826 visitors other than myself. 25 of these visitors came from an unknown country.
